My dear Father

Our delayed Canadian mail has all come in a bunch and now have letters from you and Mr Holmes covering the period of your 3 weeks away and also your long and interesting personal letter of 2nd March written after your return.

The contents of these letters covering your difficulties with coal shortage and your securing of another order for shells and the steady improvement of output and completion of Schiss order 5 days after promise seem most satisfactory in every way and I will not attempt

to answer you in detail.
Your visits to the eastern
agencies were well timed and
are sure will have good
results and conditions at less
agencies seem to be as satisfactory
as can be expected under the
circumstances.

I am glad you had such nice
visits with Elaine, Aunt May
and Estelle and I am sure
they were all more than
delighted to see you. I only
hope you did not lose too
much sleep on the trains
and that you did not suffer
too much from the cold and
are not over fatigued by so
much travelling.

Your letter is very tactfully
done with a lot of care
You get this another two or

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three weeks may elapse which
does indeed seem to make us
very far apart.

I am sending the cable bath
will tonight as I cannot very
well answer your questions
without confirming full Wood
and I cannot discuss these
things very well over the
telephone especially as it is
hard to hear him), although
we keep in touch with each
other that way and I know
how he is before I cable.

I also have a very nice
letter from Mr. Hastings, far
which please thank him
and which I will answer in
due course after shoving it
to Wood.

I also have a short letter
from Sir George in which he

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says that you have discussed
his Round Robin again and
concluded that such an
arrangement is not necessary
as our respective mills look
after what it covers
satisfactorily. I am very glad
indeed to hear this as both
Wood and I thought it subfluous.
I quite agree with what you
say about Walter Evans and
Plant as we must hang onto
our boiler and shiffing
business is as hard as we can
as at will be all we have
after the war is over. By
the way what is Harry Marshall
doing now?

I should have thought that
Evans would have had a
better chance to sell the B.S.P.
Olivetts than Plant but

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you know best, I too will be
glad to be rid of them but
you may not ~~complain~~ so badly
after all.

Private Uncle Charles Mr. Burdell
about a month ago and well
try and ~~see~~ ~~them~~ posted.

I am glad you get an
addition around and do not
think you could have done
more to get a bigger price.

According to the ~~list~~ you sent
me of \$3.60 per shell there
still should be a 10% margin in
them at this price if the marks ~~VII~~
do not cost more.

I sincerely hope your tender
to War Office ~~now~~, Jellice Baileys
and clippers goes through as
business like that is almost
unravelable to shells, in fact is.
Follow it up as hard as you can

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and if possible see into whose
hands the timber goes in
England as there might not
likely this summer be chance
that Wooday I could allow it
up if we should happen to get
it England in near future
Now about extension to
Practise Stop I would say
that our suffer business
must not suffer and that
if you consider its extension
necessary to keep this business
in our hands, and for repairs
go ahead with it, I think Wood
will help the same but will
see him as soon as possible
and cable as suggested.

I would stipulate on my
own part however that no
further extension be put up
without provision for at least

at 10 ton travelling crane
over the 54 feet fair at
least over 30 feet of the
width. We will be sorry in the
~~future~~ if we do not make
this provision and I don't see
why such a provision could
not be made at very slight
cost. You do not ~~need~~ to put
the crane in now but at
least provide for it. I think
we are very short sighted if
we don't.

I would also suggest extending
to the street while you are
at it but (do not mind as much)
about this as about the crane
which I do want to see as it
will save the extra cost many
times over if we make tractors
or extend our baileys business

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With reference to 8 " \$ 9.2 "

Shells would say that these
are the shells that do the
real work here and I feel they
will be more in demand than
60 pounds but I think we were
wise in not undertaking them
under circumstances and hope
we can get enough of 60 lbs
to see us through the year. At
any rate as we did not start
at the high price ~~of~~ 23 it is
not wise thinking of the larger
sizes now. It would help
greatly a new Soap in London
last and a new Manager and
everything which lets not
think we were in a position
to provide.

The St John warehouse I
quite agree with having the
rock removed but won't

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express an opinion on building
until Isle Wood. I have every
confidence in Evans and agree
with what you say about him
but feel it is a bad time to
build. However will think it
over and confer and report
again as soon as possible.

The ~~days~~ letters I have are

Feb 19th - Feb 26 - Mar 3rd. They
all came together.

I am not very keen on Royal
Bank and will make inquiries
here as Rockham my new
signalling officer is an ex-banker.
You make what inquiries you
can also. I would prefer Montreal
as a route but of course it does
not matter if this is only
a temporary account.

Am very pleased about
purchase of Fitzgerald preferred

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I took per your cable but will
await further particulars of
how you managed it by letter.

I understand from R.S.H. that
possibly it was done without
touching our purchases of
French British war loan.

Things quiet here at present
but a lot of guns coming in
and a lot of shells are going
to be used. This is truly
an artillery war.

When are your friends up
"Yanks" going to come in
nearly midnight so well close
the capes yourself and don't
worry about us. I am needless
to say much happier and more
contented in having a command
at last and am. Glad I allined
your good advice and waited
11 months for it. much love
