Dear Mother

Am back at my old billet again  
for a day or so. Having left one  
squadron (McEwen) up in front  
and have been going over some of  
dear Woods things and sorting out  
his papers. A sad sad business  
and a lump rises in my throat  
very often.

Your dear cable came yesterday  
and did help so as it seemed to  
bring us closer together. It was  
sweet of you to think of me when  
I know how your dear hearts  
are torn but it did help.

I am sorry I did not cable  
more fully a week ago and more  
especially say that the dear boy  
did not offer as soon

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certain he was practically paralyzed from the beginning as Lt. Gruich had to hold his bands on the stretcher ~~and~~ as they otherwise would have hung over the sides and he said turned that he had no feeling in his legs, but complained of being cold which is always a bad sign I am told. Lt. however covered him with his own coat and he was well wrapped in the ambulance to which it did not take more than 15 or 20 minutes to reach.

I was not able to see Dr. GALLAGHER who dressed his wound at the dressing station but Mr. Ewen saw him for me on Monday. He said Wood was unconscious and his heart and breathing very weak when he arrived there and only slightly

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responded to a restorative. He examined him all over very carefully for another wound but could only find the one in the top of the left arm and was of the opinion that the bullet had penetrated from there. This confirms my own opinion although it seems futile now to bother yet I feel you want to know everything and for that reason have left absolutely nothing back.

Sure he did not suffer much and was spared a long carry over trenches and shell holes front line like some poor fellows I have, as he was not more than 400 yards from the road where the first aid post was.

I have his diary and parole

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live now and will send at by  
registered post to Father tomorrow.  
I had a little trouble getting it but  
succeeded and will include the mouths  
in the portfolio as well.

I will also send an inventory of  
his kit which I am having  
by feuilleton.

I do wish you could see Robertson  
soon as he knows more about him  
personally for last year than anyone  
as they were very close friends. I  
spent Monday night with him and  
he told me so many little things  
about the dear boy. He had H. C.  
with Canon Scott at his former  
position about a month ago and  
remarked about the attack of Easter  
that "the better the day the better the  
disease".

I have to go up to see Mr Brewster

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this afternoon but will try and  
will again tonight and send a  
deferred cable again today with  
more particulars I was pretty  
well fixed out last night and  
went asleep when I sat down to  
write as I had intended. However  
I feel better today after a good  
sleep and am glad to say have  
gotten rid of my German  
Opposites!!!

"God's diary" is right up to date  
and beautifully kept. I would like  
to read it but know how Father  
will want it so will get it  
off as soon as possible.

dear dear Father & Mother & all  
my dear friends seems nothing when  
I think of how your dear hearts  
are tormented. Just decayed help.
