Innis and Aubrey had lunch with us and I talked to the latter who will write you what he thinks of the Tractor business.

Paid \$179.50 for my Insurance due on the 16th.

Board met and decided not to extend Mounting shop for new Blacksmith shop West 46'8" for \$1980. Which we consider altogether too high. Phoned Mr. McBride to hold plans for the present. This item I have not made you aware of but we have been considering it for sometime and is the portion covered by the S.I.roof used lately as a storage for shells and make and carpenter shop. We will look into the matter when weather moderates a little. This month so far has been a terror on fuel. Very little doing in the office. Will tender to the Imperial Oil Co. Barnia for 2 - 25 H.P. Ret. Tub.Boilers at 25 on our list. We have one boiler in stock and can make the other in ten days. Did not go down to office after lunch, spent the evening in the library and firing up.
